MAYOR ROB FORD'S ONGOING SHENANIGANS had no apparent effect on Toronto's 16th annual conclave of designers and architects. The show drew over 50,000 attendees, and attracted such luminaries as Dror Benshetrit, Dennis Askins for Successful Living from Diesel, and Patrizia Moroso (the guest of honour), who each delivered inspiring talks on opening day.

Offstage, Caesarstone led the way in what became a recurring theme, a growing interest in reprising the past with new forms and materials. The quartz manufacturer, in collaboration with London's Raw-Edges Design Studio, presented a series of domestic environments crafted out of quartz composite, which looked nothing like what we're used to seeing. The kitchen, for instance, displayed cabinetry that sat atop counters or

slipped into cut-outs like vertical drawers. The result: a grouping of serene, minimalist and poetic archipelagos.

Meanwhile, Hauser replaced the classic Muskoka chair with a version in non-porous high-density polyethylene; and Jardin de Ville reincarnated its outdoor furniture offcuts into sporty shoulder bags and hanging planters. Old becoming new also transpired in MSDS Studio's See the Light, a box that seems infinite, thanks to rows of Foscarini pendants reflected in surrounding mirrors. Though the monochromatic installation took cues from Superstudio's 1969 Continuous Monument, it had an of-the-moment air, perhaps enhanced by how many times it was photographed via selfies, Oxford's word of the year for 2013. AZ
