



Romantic Retreat

Some rooms are merely built, while others are impeccably well-dressed. "Your home should be like your favorite outfit," says interior designer Cindy Rinfret. It should feel comfortable, yet luxurious, she says—like a perfect cashmere sweater with a pair of flattering jeans.

That philosophy guided the elegantly layered and accessorized design of this 13×20-foot bath in Greenwich, Connecticut. This feminine room is part of a suite with separate baths for the husband and wife. It called for a romantic decor—something glamorous but not frilly, soothing yet functional.

The result is a bath that feels more

like a dressing room, with a focus on freestanding furniture. Just inside the entrance, the wall of the shower is to the left, subtly defining a vestibule. Directly ahead, an elegant armoire with antiquemirrored doors establishes the tone. In the grand space beyond the shower, a taupe-and-silver dressing table stretches before windows with sumptuously long drapes. Mirrored doors lend glamour to an architectural vanity cabinet. The freestanding tub, with its egg-shape design, is as much a contemporary sculpture as a place for a quiet soak. Behind the armoire, a toilet is discreetly set apart in a private compartment.

The roomy walk-in shower includes a contemporary frameless surround, while the interior combines two classic tile treatments: subway tile on the walls and a black-and-white mosaic underfoot.
