The Backstory

Having a vision and sticking to it can prevent a slew of design pains - unless you're just a bit ahead of the style zeitgeist. After scouring Vancouver for concrete Moroccan floor tiles, designer Tanya Schoenroth and her clients finally took to the web to find the key element they wanted for this home's principal ensuite. "It was stressful." says Tanya. who relaxed only after the tiles arrived through customs in one piece. Made in two tones of grey, the floor tiles provide the wow factor in this otherwise simple space. "This is their dream home," says Tanya. "They're not going anywhere, so they were willing to invest in the design." That meant two skylights that fill the bathroom with natural light, heated floors, a glassed-in steam shower and a deep, freestanding tub with a window view. Even subtle details, like the room's shadow mouldings (distinguished from the wall by a thin reveal) and a marble-lined nook beside the tub, create a feeling of thoughtful luxury. "I see a lot of the same finishes; this is more unique," says Tanya. "It turned out beautifully."



Luxe Shower

The steam shower is fitted with a flush-mount rain shower head and wall rail in a brushed-nickel finish. A bench made of Carrara marble blends with the walls. And instead of drywall, a frosted-glass door conceals the water closet for an airier look. Shower fixtures, Aquabrass; basket, towels The Cross; floor tile, Popham Design.

Extra-Long Vanity

The vanity extends the length of the wall to offer a range of storage. "After the floor, the mirrors and pendants are my favourite things," Tanya says. Black metal trim gives them an industrial feel. Vanity fabrication, Swiss Touch Construction; pendants, Arteriors; faucets, Aquabrass; sinks, Victoria + Albert.

Marble Niche

"We were going to cover the tub wall in marble, but decided it would be too much visually. This gives it a little something," says Tanya. **Wall colour**, Snow White (OC-66), Benjamin Moore.
