

# House of Jewels

Choose the right hardware to imbue your home with individual style

he secret to many beautiful scenes is found in the details, and the home is no exception. Like a great pair of earrings, cabinet and door knobs, pulls and levers add the final flourish to any room, with up-to-date options providing unique materials, finishes and styles to match your personal taste. From clean, contemporary lines and innovative textures to clever mix-and-match pairings, a plethora of characterful options abound for the Southwest home.

#### **CLEAN AND SIMPLE**

Today's casual lifestyles call for straightforward, functional design, which is easy to translate into hardware. The door lever, for instance, has seen a renaissance over its knob counterpart due to its linear silhouette and ease of use. One good example is the classically elegant Estate Lever by Baldwin Hardware. Its shoehorn-shaped handle fits naturally in the palm of your hand. With 20 finish options, it's also adaptable for a variety of interiors.



Styles of the past are being reinterpreted in sleek modern ways as well, as seen in popular transitional designs. "Midcentury modern continues to be a prominent trend in hardware, and we are also starting to see a resurgence of Art Deco and geometric forms," says PJ Rosch, brand manager for Baldwin Hardware. "We are taking these styles and making them fresh again through current sensibilities."

Zimran Cadle, door hardware specialist for Central Arizona Supply, weighs in on the popu-

larity of transitional hardware in Arizona homes. "With all of the remodels and new houses going up in the Valley, people are really being drawn to hardware that goes with contemporary architecture," he says. "The transitional style can also give an older home an instant, but not jarring, update." Classic styles in modern finishes like polished chrome and brushed nickel straddle the line between contemporary and traditional.

#### ONE OF A KIND

A shift toward highly personalized homes has created a demand for artisanal hardware-something David Tyler of Atlas Homewares calls jewelry for cabinets. "The luxury handmade hardware we are seeing today has this great depth of field and, when set with high-quality plating, takes on this gorgeous three-dimensional look," he says.

The company's new Steam Punk collection, for instance, is inspired by the popular literary genre, blending old-time character with 21st-century performance. The hardware series resembles pipework in a range of finishes. Exposed pipes of a hair salon inspired the firm's CEO to conceive the collection.

Hardware designers are also aligning with trends in home furnishings. The new Tressé collection from Keeler, for instance, features a tufted motif that repeats today's tufted-backed upholstery. "People are beginning to accent certain parts of their kitchens or bathrooms with fun or unusual hardware," adds Tyler. "They might put blingy pieces on a special cabinet or on another piece of furniture that they want to stand out."

#### **TOPS AND BOTTOMS**

Hardware takes on another level of interest with the growing trend of mixing and matching materials and placement within the home. The endless possibilities of finishes and styles are able to coexist in any setting.

"We're seeing hardware with different finishes being used in the same home," notes Tyler. "It works as long as the pieces have a similar style or shape. For instance, the knobs may be different on the upper cabinets versus the lower ones in a kitchen."

Rosch adds that new hardware featuring mixed materials also makes it easier to create a truly unique look. "I've seen crystal, porcelain and even leather being infused into today's hardware designs," he says. "It's about choosing what is beautiful, timeless and classic."
