


SWITCH IT UP


Volcanic craters in Auvergne, France, are the source for Pyrolave's lava stone countertops. Blocks of stone are mined from the craters, formed into slabs, and infused with enamel glaze to create colorful options suitable for kitchens, baths and fireplace surrounds. The durable material can be installed indoors or out and manufactured in extra-long lengths without seams. A variety of colors is offered in both matte and glossy finishes; pictured is Indigo. ANGLED APPROACH

Reminiscent of Moorish designs, the Alhambra ceramic art tile features a geometric motif. Looking to add character to your powder room or wine cellar? Then you might want to investigate Native Trails' new Vintner's Collection of vanities, sinks and mirrors.

The Bordeaux Wall Mount Vanity (pictured) is handcrafted of staves salvaged from old oak wine barrels; its top is made of crema marble; and the sink is hand-hammered brushed-nickel, created with post-consumer recycled copper dipped in nickel.

The beveled-glass mirror is framed with wood from the lid of an oak wine barrel and bears the original barrel maker's stamp.




ALUMINUM REINVENTED ▶


Those scads of aluminum soda cans and old car parts don't have to end up in a dump, according to current green think ing. Du Verre, The Hardware Co., has taken that premise seriously with several collections of die-cast knobs and pulls manufactured from post-consumer recycled aluminum.

Engaged by Du Verre, designer William Harvey created The Lotus Collection (pictured), which comes in four finishes: Oilrubbed Bronze, Satin Nickel, Polished Nickel and Black Matte.




Above: With a window that captures the greenery of mesquite trees by day and stars at night—plus a deep free-standing tub for soothing soaks—the master bath offers sensuous spa appeal. Walls and wainscoting are clad in Rainforest Verde marble mosaic tiles, and flooring is made of limestone with insets of Verde marble dots. Inventiveness is a strong part of her design arsenal, O'Malley points out. As an example, next to the bathtub is a tree trunk that the designer put to use as a small table. "I sanded it and lacquered the top," she says. Opposite top: The centerpiece of the master bedroom, the platform bed is upholstered in a pale slate-blue cotton. The crewel-work comforter features flowers that pick up soft hues, including that of the bed and the sand-color carpet. Opposite bottom: In the master bedroom sitting area, a fire-place set into a travertine-covered wall sheds light and warmth, while the double chaise offers a place of repose.

Square Flair

hen several of her clients wanted to let daylight into their bathrooms without losing their privacy, interior designer Cathryn Abel O'Malley came up with a novel window treatment. It was so appealing that she adopted it when remodeling her own master bath (pictured above).

"I call it window jewelry," she says of the ice cube-like artistry that climbs halfway up the window, allowing views of garden greenery and open sky, and providing a glistening curtain effect. To get the look she wanted, O'Malley designed and crafted small acrylic squares, mounting each on special string akin to clear plastic fishing wire.

In a nook surrounding her free-standing bathtub, O'Malley repeated the square shapes in wainscoting and a wall treatment composed of a mosaic of Rainforest Verde marble squares. Turn to Page 78 to see more of this designer's home.
