A DESIGNER TRANSFORMS HER OUTDATED KITCHEN INTO A BRIGHT AND SPACIOUS COUNTRY CLASSIC

s head of her own eponymous design firm, Ingrid Leess is a whiz at pulling together creative and welcoming environments for her clients. When the time was right for redoing her own kitchen, she was well prepared, having researched the project thoroughly. "Remember the scene from the movie A Beautiful Mind, where the office walls are covered with paper and notes? For years, that's how my kitchen looked, with floor plans, tear sheets and product swatches pinned up everywhere," she says.

Ingrid knew when she purchased the 1940sera farmhouse in the Connecticut countryside that the small, dark kitchen would eventually need redoing. And when the opportunity to focus on the job finally presented itself, the stakes had been raised; her two daughters had become accomplished cooks, one of them even working at the Food Network.

Gaining space for the three women to work together and increasing the light level in the kitchen were Ingrid's priorities. Taking out the wall that separated the dining room from the adjacent kitchen addressed the first concern, but conversely created a larger space to brighten. Wanting to enhance the homey nature of the house's architecture, the designer opted to install banks of windows on the kitchen's three exterior walls to channel as much daylight as possible into the room.

This dovetailed with another design goal: to

control the character of the newly opened floor plan. "I didn't want people sitting at the dining table looking into a space that was obviously a kitchen," says Ingrid. Trading out wall cabinets for windows achieves this objectivebut what about the storage capacity that was sacrificed? A new pantry, carved from a former hallway, proved the ideal solution. Fitted with an adjustable organizer system, it supplements the storage offered by the drawers in the island and new crisp, white perimeter base cabinets. The arrangement happens to be a boon to cooks who are petite in stature, too, as there's no stretching to reach the contents of a wall-hung cupboard. New painted ceiling planks also increase the character quotient.

Although the appliances were replaced, they remained, for the most part, in or close to their original locations. A cousin in Sweden-yet another foodie in

the family-convinced Ingrid to install an induction cooktop. "I love it!" says the designer, citing its rapid heating rate and wipe-clean surface.

The finishes used in the kitchen were selected to bolster the lightness of the space. Topping the white-painted cabinets are slabs of a quartz-based composite; impervious to the stains that a busy household can generate, it doesn't require periodic sealing. The milky-white counters have an organic pattern that's similar to limestone—a material more suited to this rural setting than polished granite.

The dining area continues the casual mood of the kitchen. A new window seat includes drawers that house linens right where they will be used. Surrounded by big windows and French doors, guests now enjoy the view of the garden outside as much as the revitalized kitchen within.

HEATING UP Hidden beneath the island countertop, the microwave oven and a warming drawer are just steps away from the stove and wall oven.



EASY ACCESS Having an adjustable storage system in the pantry freed the designer/homeowner from committing to fixed shelving.



SECRET CHAMBER A drawer-within-a-drawer is concealed by a single front panel, preserving the uniform appearance of the cabinets while delivering flexible storage.



CHILLING OUT A combination beverage cooler and wine chiller stands just outside the kitchen, where it serves thirsty guests while keeping them out of the way of busy cooks.
