


## BATHING BEAUTY

Big-box staples, like Pottery Barn lamps and bedding and a Restoration Hardware upholstered headboard, mingle effortlessly with the antique mirror over the bed. To add dimension, shiplap was affixed to only the top portion of the walls, drawing the eyes up and making the ceilings look taller.

While niceties like pretty textiles and tchotchkes next-leveled the majority of the home, the kitchen took a bit more elbow grease. After revising the layout, hardworking materials were incorporated, including virtually indestructible quartz countertops. Wanting the kitchen to have an open, farmhouse aesthetic without feeling too country-kitsch, Mathis masterfully mixed vernacular favorites (think open shelving, shiplap, subway tile) with modern details.
