1. IN A WALNUT SHELL

Store things your way with custom utensil drawers in a new standard: walnut.

Available only as part of an overall cabinetry package, dovetailed drawers are solid 5/8"-thick walnut on all four sides. Drawer bottoms are ½" walnut plywood locked to a routed groove. Crown Point Cabinetry, (800) 999-4994, crown-point.com

2. DISCRETION IN PLUMBING

Inspired by 1890s styling, the Regent deck-mounted mixer with hand spray makes short work of washing mud off boots or pets. The retractable hose is 1.5 meters long. In 18 finishes, \$2,116 and up. Barber Wilsons, (800) 727-6317, barberwilsons.com

3. DECO ELEGANCE

These rotary dimmer switches are part of a collection inspired by Art Deco models of the 1930s. All can be configured for 21st-century lamping, in finishes from unlacquered brass to nickel silver: \$189 and up. Forbes & Lomax, (212) 486 9700, forbesandlomax.com

4. ITTY BITTY TABLE

5. TAKE A SEAT FOR TWO
